Children in Worship



The Collect of the Day

The Collect (pronounced "kol-ect") of the Day is an appointed prayer that collects the theme of the day in the Church year found in the readings.

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

The Lessons: Old Testament and Epistle

The first reading is typically from the Old Testament (or Hebrew Scriptures), which Jesus knew and from which he often quoted. The second reading, taken from the New Testament, is typically from a letter to the early Church.

The Reader begins by saying, "A Reading from _____." and ends with "The Word of the Lord." The people respond, "**Thanks be to God.**"

The Psalm

Between the two readings we chant a psalm. The psalms are poems from the Old Testament (or Hebrew Scriptures). Psalms express the breadth of human emotions and reflect our relationship with God and one another. See the bulletin insert for this week's psalm.

Children's Chapel

Following the second reading, children three years of age to second grade are welcome to follow the cross to the downstairs meeting room for Children's Chapel. They will return at The Peace. On the first Sunday of the month the children remain for a children's sermon.

Sequence Hymn

The Gospel Lesson

This reading is from one of the four gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John), which narrate the life, death, and resurrection of our Savior Jesus Christ. We stand as we are able for the Gospel.

The gospeller begins by saying, "The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to ______." And the people respond, "**Glory to you, Lord Christ.**" The gospeller ends by saying "The Gospel of the Lord." The people respond, "**Praise to you, Lord Christ.**"

Sermon

The Nicene Creed

Book of Common Prayer, p. 358

The Nicene Creed, originally composed in the late fourth century, expresses our core beliefs as Christians. When reciting the Nicene Creed we narrate what God has done, and continues to do, for us.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth. of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made. of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayers of the People

Having proclaimed all that God has done for us, we express before God how the world is not as it should be. We pray for the Church, our country, the welfare of the world, the concerns of the community, those who suffer, and the departed. The responses by the people to the prayers are found in your insert.



Praise God from whom all blessings flow; praise him, all creatures here below; praise him above, ye heavenly host: praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.


The Great Thanksgiving



But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Celebrant Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new

Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Celebrant We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**


Celebrant and People

The Invitation to Holy Communion

Celebrant The Gifts of God for the People of God.

All are welcome at the Lord's table. To receive a blessing rather than communion simply cross your arms when the clergy approaches. Gluten-free wafers are available; please make your need known to the minister. After receiving the bread, you may sip from the cup or hold up your wafer and the lay eucharistic minister will dip the wafer into the wine for you. Alternatively, you may touch the base of the cup as a sign of receiving the wine. Receiving the bread alone is considered full participation in the sacrament.

On occasion, a member of the congregation is commissioned to take consecrated bread and wine to a person or persons who are unable to be with us this morning.

People We who are many are one body, because we all share one bread, one cup.

Seasons of the Church Year

Changes You See and Hear in Worship during Easter at St. Peter's

White and Gold: The liturgical color for Easter is typically white or gold, symbolizing celebration. Notice how the colors of the frontal at the altar and at the pulpit change with the seasons of the Church year. On Pentecost Day, the color will be red.

Alleluia: The Alleluias have returned. Alleluia is a joyful word of praise derived from the ancient Hebrew "hallelujah" and our most festive word. We sing Alleluia out of joy for the risen Christ.

Confession: It is the custom of the Episcopal Church to omit the confession during Easter. The reason is that the 50 days of Easter are a time of great celebration of the risen Christ. Through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection we have been forgiven of our sins. Omitting the confession acknowledges that we stand as a people forgiven by God, for which we give great thanks. The confession will return at Pentecost and remain until next Easter.

Eucharistic Prayer A: The Episcopal Church has nine Eucharistic Prayers from which to choose for our principal Sunday service found in the *Book of Common Prayer* and *Enriching Our Worship.* Prayers are chosen based on the season of the church year and sometimes the observance of the day. During Lent we used Eucharistic Prayer 1 from Enriching Our Worship. During Easter we return to a more familiar prayer found in the *Book of Common Prayer* with a preface appropriate for Easter.

Singing the Eucharistic Prayer: Because Easter is a time of great joy, we are singing portions of the Eucharistic Prayer.
